2000 National Parks (Scotland) Act

2002 Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park established

2003 Cairngorms National Park established

2003 Land Reform (Scotland) Act formalised right of access to the countryside and led to **Scotland's Outdoor Access Code** and local authority responsibility to develop a **Core Path Strategy**.

In **2004 Jonathon Porritt** gave the first RTPI & Saltire Society **Patrick Geddes memorial lecture** on **Sustainable Development Past & Present**. He was followed in **2005** by **Raymond Young** on **Cities in Devolution**.



In **2005** possible areas for **marine National Parks** were proposed

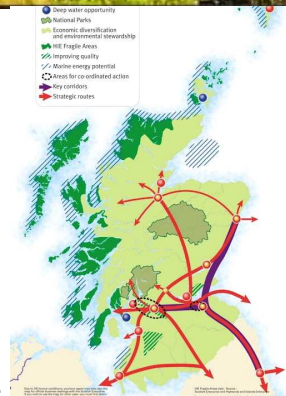
2001 Scottish e-planning group began work;

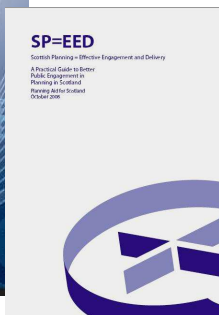

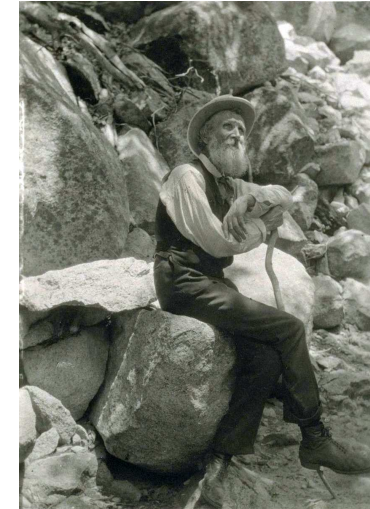
